Zoom. That is no longer correct. State buildings are
open to the public. The Retirement Commission, I
believe, made a decision to continue to hold the
meetings via Zoom.

And I don't know what that date was, but John Herrington, maybe you can help me. It was probably last month that the Governor put out something - or Mike Carey - that the State buildings are open to the public. Our building was opened.

CHAIRPERSON ADOMEIT: Thank you for that correction.

Okay. The Chairman's report, once again, thank you to the Division and John Herrington and Marty Carlson and all the other people who have made this system work under great stress and difficulties. Maybe when we get to Marty Carlson, we'd like to discuss the issue of the Governor's attempt to reduce the number of people retiring by making adjustments to pay. I know nothing more than what I've read in the paper, but if Marty has knowledge of that, why don't you indicate that now, Marty.

MS. CARLSON: I mean, anecdotally, I mean, you know, we continually get asked by the administration, and in particular, DAS is concerned

about what we think the number is going to be. know, quite honestly, we can only tell you what the eligibility number is. We have no idea how many are going to retire. Personally, based on what - you know, I think Mike Carey may be better able to address this on whether the incentives are enough to keep people. Personally, I don't think so. I don't - I think if there were another approach of smoothing out, you know, like they did the ERIPs with Governor Rell that, you know, folks who needed to stay could stay for a couple of years to get through the critical process. 

That might have resonated, but John, do you feel the same way? I'm just not seeing a big enough - or I'm unaware of a big enough, quote unquote, incentive, I think, as the Governor is speaking, that would alter folks who really want to go.

But, Mike, you may have a better idea about this.

MR. CAREY: So - and, Marty, this is Mike Carey. And I guess I would say that there are some matters that are pending-

MS. CARLSON: Okay.

MR. CAREY: --in terms of collective bargaining, which I would suggest is not appropriate for discussions here because those negotiations are not

final.

MS. CARLSON: Mm-hmm.

MR. CAREY: And adding to that, there's really no way to predict whether the outcome of those negotiations will have any effect on the numbers of people retiring. But I think that based upon the ground rules that the State has set with the collective bargaining agents on - for negotiations, that this would not be a subject to take up here.

MS. CARLSON: Okay, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ADOMEIT: Thank you, Michael. Thank you, Marty.

Okay. Division Director's report.

MR. HERRINGTON: Yes, so we have been focused for a number of months on preparing for 2022. We know that there was going to be an uptick in work, and this is the first month where we're really seeing, you know, very, very large numbers that we need to work through. We track these intents to retire. So individuals notify their agency of their intent to retire on a specific date. We ask that they provide us that information as early in the process as possible so that we can get a head start on the work.

We have right now 1,048 intents to retire for April of this year. That is, you know, four or five,

six times what we would see in a typical month. Right now, with all the intents to retire for 2022, we're already over 3,200 intents to retire, so that's more than would retire in a typical month. If we're looking from, you know, the individuals that retired July 1st of last year carrying through to July 1st of this year, if we don't receive a single additional intent to retire, that would put us at just about 4,600 retirements for that 12-month period, so a very large number, and we expect that it would grow.

Mike Carey, feel free to stop me if I go too far talking about the negotiations. What I have seen is that the idea that there are negotiations, there are articles in the newspaper, that that has perhaps given pause to some individuals. I haven't seen anything where I've seen someone indicate that they aren't going to retire, but there are individuals that were planning to retire in April that have indicated that maybe they're going to wait and see what happens before they go in July.

So that's the extent that I've seen an impact from those negotiations. But we continue to work kind of feverishly to get all of this work done. We're holding more webinars to help to educate the population, and we're working with the DAS pod to

assist the DAS pod in increasing their capacity to deal with individuals one-on-one. So those are the kind of our major goals. I mean, as I said, we've been preparing for it, but we certainly are feeling it right now.

We don't have a great number of intents for June and July, and we anticipate that those are actually going to be the heaviest months. So we do believe that there's a lot more that will be coming our way.

CHAIRPERSON ADOMEIT: Okay, thank you, John.

MR. HERRINGTON: And then I do believe that

Yam has a statement for the Commission.

MS. MENON: Hi, folks. Yam Menon, General Counsel. Just wanted to update folks because the notifications from the Office of State Ethics are starting to go out. So this is a time of year to start filing your statement of financial interests. This is required for everyone. It is due Monday, May 2<sup>nd</sup>. You will get several email notifications about it. I wanted to do a verbal notification as well.

The filing, although you do it in 2022, it's for the preceding calendar year. So it's a 2021 filing, although you're doing it in 2022. So that confused folks

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   sometimes, so I just wanted to make a note of that.
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                Importantly new for this year, based on the
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   passage of Public Act 21-164, paper filings will no
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   longer be accepted. So you must complete it
   electronically. If you have any questions, feel free to
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   reach out, but most of you end up doing it online, and
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   most of you have your information already in there. So
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   it's probably just updating for a lot of you and
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   hopefully straightforward and quick.
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                So we're about six weeks out from that
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   deadline, so I just wanted to make a note. And as we get
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   closer to that timeline, you will - if you have not filed
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   close to that deadline, you're going to start getting a
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   lot of notifications about it. Because if we do not file
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   on time, the Office of State Ethics can pursue a legal
   process where penalties could be involved monetary-wise.
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                So that's it. I just wanted to remind folks
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   about that. Again, Monday, May 2^{nd} is the deadline for
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   your statement of financial interests. Thank you.
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                CHAIRPERSON ADOMEIT: Thank you, Yam.
                MS. CARLSON: Mr. Chairman, can I just add a
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   couple of things after John for my own report?
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                CHAIRPERSON ADOMEIT: Do you want to talk
   now?
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                MS. CARLSON: Just a couple of things. One
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is that despite the fact that, you know, John and - I 1 agree with John that we just don't know what's going to 2 3 happen in July. I feel pretty confident that we at least know what's going to happen in the Comptroller's Office. 4 There may be a couple of stragglers, but we are 5 currently, I believe, at 50 retirees of 250 employees. 6 Forty-six of them have agreed to come back as TWR's. 7 8 I think I've said to you before that virtually every person in the agency from every division 9 touches a retirement. And if they don't touch a 10 retirement, we are asking divisions to send folks to help 11 us in any way they can to get through the surge. I want 12 to, you know, soft of personally thank the DAS 13 Commissioner and the OPM folks because they have rapid-14 15 fire approved all of our TWR's so we are all set with TWR approvals and what they're going to be paid. And then 16 secondly, they are also quickly approving refills for 17 those TWR's, which, you know, those of us who run 18 19 agencies know that sometimes when people quit or retire, 20 you can't get a refill for a while, and even that refill, you know, comes in, you know, very new and unschooled in 21 22 what the job is. 23 But because the TWR's are going to be here at the agency, we are going to be able to in-tandem train 24

the refills while the TWR's are in the agency. So, you

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   know, we are - hopefully, John, you will agree with me -
   that we are, between the technology and the support of
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   DAS approvals and OPM approvals, we are probably in the
   best place we could possibly be to handle June and July.
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                John, I think, stated, you know, April is
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   over 1,000 and we are confident that we will get through
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   those and get everyone their pension benefit by the end
   of April. We're still a little shaky on by the end of
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   July, but we're in the best possible position given the
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   support of many folks on this call. Thank you.
