CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Thank you, Cindy.

And the Chairman's Report is going to be brief and sad. We all know of the passing of Fae.

There were two statements issued formally, one by Comptroller Braswell, one by myself. Now if I could briefly read those statements to you in case you have not received them.

From Natalie Braswell, Comptroller: Fae was a dedicated public servant who was gifted in navigating the complexities of labor management issues and collective bargaining. Connecticut is a better state because of her time in state government. Even in stressful and chaotic situations, Fae was a calm and kind presence, always quick with a solution and a folksy idiom. On behalf of the entire Comptroller's Office, I extend my heartfelt condolences to her loved

ones and colleagues.

I'll read a statement from the Chairman of the Commission, myself. As a longtime member of the Retirement Commission, Fae was universally respected for her cooperation and expertise. She will be greatly missed. My thoughts and those of the other members of the Commission are with Fae's family and friends during this difficult time. And there will be a brief moment of silence starting now.

That concludes the Chairman's Report.

Division Director's Report?

MR. HERRINGTON: Yes. This was quite the surprise. I think, you know, we all can agree that Fae helped the Commission along tremendously, but particularly me in my position as Director. As I came into this division and had to navigate some of the other kind of day-to-day issues that required clarification on previous party agreements, she was like - she was absolutely an invaluable resource, so she will definitely be sorely missed. And she was also just a pleasure to work with. And I mean, she was always helpful, and she just made my life easier as I worked through a number of thorny issues, and she will definitely be missed.

In terms of the Director's Report, we

certainly are right in the midst of this 2022 surge that we've been preparing for. If there was any question in terms of whether there would actually be a surge, that question was answered this month. We had over 1,100 retirements to process in April, and so that is more than half of a typical year's worth of retirements all in April. Thankfully, however, due to our preparations and our utilization of technology, we were able to get through that number relatively quickly.

Whereas historically we would process retirements right up until the close of the payroll, we were actually in a very strong position where we were able to process many of those right around the First of April. And so that's quite an achievement within the Retirement Division, but also the benefits in Payroll Division.

So our hard work has kind of paid off.

There's still quite a bit of work to be done going forward. June and July project to be heavy. Between those two months, right now, there's another 1,500 out there that we have intents for retirements. We would expect that those numbers will continue to increase.

And if we don't receive a single intent, we still, for the fiscal year of - the current fiscal year, we still

would have over 5,000 total retirements over that year, which is slightly higher than what we projected when we were coming up with the assumptions for the Actuarial Valuation. So we do expect this to be a pretty significant surge going forward.

Also, as we go through, June and July are going to be a little bit more difficult in the sense that April was kind of sandwiched between two relatively light months. You know, we had 300 retirements in March, and it looks as though we have just around 200 for May. So we were able to concentrate, you know, our efforts on April for a considerable period of time. We aren't necessarily going to have that luxury in June because we expect June to be heavy and July to be even heavier, and they'll be back-to-back.

Also, one of the complications with the June and July populations would be that that's when the higher ed populations retire, and unfortunately, just due to the nature of higher ed employment, there's a larger proportion of those cases that don't kind of lend themselves to the automatic processing through the benefit calculator just due the nature of that employment where they have, you know, secondary positions, parttime lecturing, sabbatical leaves and

the like. So even if the number for June and July is about where we are for April, or perhaps a little bit lighter, it's still going to be a very difficult month.

But the Division is kind of laser focused on getting though those numbers and we're doing a great job. And we have a plan in place, and so long as numbers are about where we stand, as difficult as it may be, we're pretty confident that we'll be able to get through the June and July surges as well. But up to this point, I think that the Division has done a great job at getting through a very large volume of work.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Thank you, John. Any questions or comments? Okay, hearing none, Marty Carlson? You're on mute, Marty.

MS. CARLSON: In a moment, Yam has to give some information too, but I just wanted to say first that regarding Fae, I wanted to also personally express my condolences to the folks on this call at OPM, in particular, OLR, and in particular, Dave Krayeski, who several months ago was pretty much thrown into - not thrown into, but had to assume responsibility of the negotiations that were very complicated for the SEBAC agreement.

And also, I'd like to also recognize the

interaction very early on that Dave Krayeski had with John Herrington, who went, you know, full tilt, as he always does in emergencies, to make sure that the records were correct for Fae, and that her family was taken care of. This is sort of the second time in the last two months that this has happened.

Every once in a while, during the course of a year, we'll get, you know, an emergency call that, you know, somebody's in trouble and needs help putting together the paperwork. We lost our - I think I might have mentioned, our 56-year-old, three-decade print shop mail handler unexpectedly a couple of months ago, and John did the same thing he is always willing to do, and that's work nights and weekends to make sure that the paperwork is in order for their families to be taken care of.

so, on that note, I also just want to underscore what John has reported on the over-one-thousand retirements that were processed on time. It is an extraordinary achievement for the Comptroller's Office. For all those of you who remember the 15,000 finalization backlog, it proves that technology works, for anyone who doubted that three years ago when all of us were a little nervous about that. But it clearly works, and we feel - John, nod your head if you feel

the same way - we feel well positioned to handle June and July. That doesn't mean that it's not going to be crazy, but we are in far better shape than we could possibly have imagined even a year ago.

So kudos to the Retirement Division, the Core-CT Division, and every division actually in the Comptroller's Office who has their - has a finger on this entire process.

So, Yam?

Zimberlin's benefit, I wanted to announce that a few trustees arrived during the proceedings. So Carl
Chisem, Trustee; Rebecca Simonsen, Trustee; and John Flores, General Counsel to the Office of the Treasurer and Ex Officio Member of the Retirement Commission are all present.

Obviously, there is a file in this matter, and the file reflects there are actually several issues in this case. One is whether the two years to apply for disability retirement means you can't get it, or whether we should waive it for what appears to be mental illness. But the second issue is the withdrawal of hazardous duty contributions, which the Division used as the reason for - not to grant the disability retirement.

The Division's position is that forfeits eligibility for receiving a disability pension. And it's not really an issue because (inaudible). The record reflects that the gentleman is eligible for voluntary retirement benefits.

So with those statements, the Chair would recognize Attorney Russell Zimberlin.

MR. ZIMBERLIN: Yes. Good morning. Patrick Butler is actually sitting right next to me. So we're requesting to toll the time in which to file a claim for disability retirement. In support of this claim for tolling, Patrick has submitted his personnel file, which included performance reports showing he was a good worker, he was effective and professional.

Patrick was promoted from a temporary position to a permanent position in 2007. However around 2010, Patrick began mental health treatment. He was initially treated at Bristol Hospital and treatment was transferred to Wheeler Clinic, where it continued. Patrick has had numerous suicide attempts and his increased symptomatology eventually resulted in the termination of his job in 2017.

Kelly Katara, who currently treats Patrick, noted that he has only been partially responsive to treatment. Patrick applied for and was granted social security disability retirement on his initial application with the onset date of October 30th, 2016, and that's prior to his agency termination date of June 6th, 2017. During the two years following his severance-from-service date, Butler did not have the mental ability to apply for disability retirement, and he was only helped to - he was only able to complete

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the application process with the help of his mom and

So how do we rectify the fact that he filed that document in April of 2019, but was not able to file for the disability retirement itself?

MR. ZIMBERLIN: I have not even been provided with that - I'd have to see that document.

LUCIANO: I think there's two points. 17 One is to follow up to see if the check was cashed 18 19 because I think that finishes everything. Or - and 20 two, if it wasn't cashed, then I think Mike Rose -21 Michael Carey made a really good point; you know, he's so out of it, he can't do anything, and yet, here he is 22 23 asking for his money back. And so I think if it wasn't cashed, then we're still there in terms of making a 24

decision on this issue.

MR. HERRINGTON: And our records indicate that it was cashed, and also in cashing it, that the 2 3 refund application requires acknowledgment of a statement that the receipt of a refund would prevent a 4 member from filing for disability. So that is all 5 information that we have now and that we can provide, 6 7 you know, to the Commission at the end of the day. So that's just what I was wondering is what's the best way to proceed forward with that. 9

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MR. LUCIANO: We didn't know that when we-MR. HERRINGTON: Right.

MR. LUCIANO: --when we made the motion (inaudible) table. We didn't know that he had cashed it.

MR. HERRINGTON: Yeah.

MR. LUCIANO: I think that - you know, that -I feel sorry for the guy; I'm sorry he's suicidal; but he's forgetful too, I guess. Either that, or his credibility leaves much to be desired.

MR. HERRINGTON: But I guess it sounds that the best thing would be, since it's tabled, just for us to provide those additional documents and for us to deal with it next month. Yep, gotcha.

MR. NEWMAN: And I just want to say for the record - this is Colin - that Attorney Zimberlin's

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statement regarding his membership in SERS, yes, he
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     refunded his hazardous duty contributions, but yes, he
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     is still a vested member and eligible for a future
     benefit because he did have 10 years of service. So he
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     will be eligible for a benefit, but it will be down the
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     road, a regular, not a hazardous duty benefit.
