MR. HERRINGTON: So I have the report. I've circulated it. This is similar to reports that we've made in past months. Our focus is throughout the rest of this year eliminating all of our existing backlogs so that we can free up any and all of our resources to devote to the 2022 potential retirement surge. We are also making efforts to provide as much information as possible to the relevant populations.

So the issue that we worked on this month is we've released a memo outlining the major highlights with respect to potential changes in 2022 and provided some context in terms of how potential retirees should factor in those changes in making their decisions. We continue to roll out our self-service tool to the population. We've rolled it out to 78 percent of those that are eligible. The last agencies that we're rolling it out to would be higher education.

So we've rolled it out to Central Connecticut
State University. We're still working through the
other State universities, community colleges, UCONN,

and the Health Center. And for a host of these students, those cases are slightly more complicated. And so as you can see, over the past year, we've made considerable efforts and had very large rollouts.

We've been rolling this out to agency by agency every two weeks. It's going to slow down a little bit as we work through these harder populations at the higher education institutions. But we certainly are on track to have all of those released by December of this year.

The benefit of that is that that gives the entire population information on demand so that they can make their decisions, but it also assists us because those cases will have already had at least one review and will be easier and quicker to audit when and if any of those individuals actually submit retirement paperwork.

As you can see, we continue to make considerable progress with the reduction of our disability backlog, and also our scheduling of disability initial applications — the initial applications, but we're at a point where just about anyone that submits their application today, so long as they have their medical records in order, will go before the MEB in at least three months. In some cases, if they submit a complete packet on day one,

they may be able to go, you know, much earlier than that. So that's probably the greatest success with the largest impact on, you know, our population, and we are certainly on track there.

We also continue to work both internally and externally on perfecting our plan in terms of assessing what options we have for increasing our productivity and/or servicing larger segments of the population in connection with 2022, but also kind of broader beyond that. So the consolidation of the DAS HR pod, the pension and leaves pod, that continues to raise some issues that we need to work through collectively.

We are teaming up with our retiree active in payroll unit and also our health and benefits unit to see what, if anything, we can do to assist there. One of the things that has come to light is that it's difficult for certain individuals to get information that they historically would have received from their agencies, and so we've created a webinar to address that. And sometime in the August timeframe, we will be conducting webinars with question-and-answer periods at least, you know, once a month, depending on how this works out, perhaps, you know, multiple times a month so that there's another avenue for individuals to have their questions answered.

It should be with the Division. Instead they're, at DAS, not doing much of anything as far as I can tell from the complaints that I've been getting from people who want to retire, but can't get any information.

MR. ADOMEIT: Thank you, Sal.

 $$\operatorname{MS.}$ CARLSON: I'm going to address what Sal is saying. We are also concerned.

MR. ADOMEIT: This is Marty Carlson talking.

We've thought from day one that the retirement pod at DAS is significantly under-resourced. And as John said, what members could used to be able to get in their HR department, in their agencies, it's not easy for them to get it now.

I'm also concerned because - or John and I were also concerned because one of the two lead members of that pod over at DAS announced a retirement, I think for October 1. So I have a call out to Nick Hermes, and I think we have a meeting scheduled, John, on how to help with that.

That being said, as all of you know, if everything goes south, you know, for 2022, the calls and the stories are not going to be about the pod at DAS; they're going to be about the Retirement Division of the Comptroller's Office. So I've set up - John and I have set up, you know, I don't know what to call it, a SWAT team or a project team of everyone on deck at the Comptroller's Office to strategize how we're going to handle the uptick. We're actually hoping that folks don't all decide to retire on July 1 of '22. That may

be in January they start.

We had a big month last month, I think of over 350 or so retirees.

MR. HERRINGTON: Two-ninety-one.

MS. CARLSON: Two-ninety-one. I'm sorry.

And we're kind of hoping that that ticks up as we go along because we will be better able to handle that.

But that is a concern.

And then I don't - you know, to give that pod the benefit of the doubt, they are really qualified and really smart and really trying. I just don't think that they can handle the volume. And to Sal's point of they should be with us, that's a conversation somebody could have, I guess. But the number that are at DAS now handling what they are required to handle would probably quadruple if it came to us because that's how under-resourced they are.

So I just want to like put that out there.

It's not a matter of, oh, let's plop the people on the pod over in the Comptroller's Office and we'll be able to handle it. We would not be able to handle it.

Second to that, on a more positive note, I would like to say for those of you who have been on the Commission for a long time, you will remember the number of audits that have come through on the

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retirement division that have had 13, 14, 15 findings.

And he did notify his agency, the Department of Corrections, of that change of address timely, yet in researching the matter for this appeal, he discovered that the agency's change of address did not go into effect until January of 2006, and that's why it was submitted as some rationale as to why Mr. Barbagallo, who has consistently claimed he had not received correspondence from the Comptroller's Office with regard to how much credit he can purchase

1 and what the purchase of that would have been. 2 Is that accurate, Vito? 3 MR. BARBAGALLO: (Inaudible) 4 MR. ADOMEIT: Okay. Thank you. Anybody on the Commission have any questions 5 of Mister - Attorney Carbone? 6 7 Okay. Hearing none-MR. CARBONE: Well, we thank you for your 8 time. And I apologize for the delayed connection here. 9 MR. ADOMEIT: You don't need to, and this is 10 a minor delay. I can relate to you horror stories that 11 will turn your hair on fire. There was no indication that it was returned unsigned or 24 undelivered. And the fact of the matter is the invoice 25

was never responded to, neither was the letter, which the letter - and the purpose of the letter was us asking for additional information regarding the small periods of active-duty service that he had while he was in the National Guard.

know, the 2005, 2006 dates, but the fact of the matter is that the invoice was sent in 2012. And the reason why it was sent later was because of the fact that the periods of time that he was requesting, at the time, they were ineligible. But because this also can change in the - you know, with federal law with respect to the dates that were now considered eligible, in - I think that was around 2006, 2007, somewhere around there, his invoice - when his invoice was sent along with the letter, it was because the dates were now eligible for retirement credit.

But, you know, the bottom line is that he never responded to the invoice and he never responded to the letter, which was sent in 2012. And so basically, his file was closed because of the no response, and it was in the letter basically saying there's no response. That is considered a permanent forfeiture of the ability to make the purchase.
