                MR. HERRINGTON: Good morning, everyone.
25

This is John Herrington. Before you, you'll see a report that reflects a far different picture than what we've seen in all the previous months this year. There were a couple changes in terms of the volume of cases that we're processing. Whereas last month, we had 1,436 retirements, this month, we had slightly fewer at 46. So quite a change for us, and we are kind of shifting our focus at this point.

One thing that we have to kind of work through is, typically what happens when we have large volumes of retirements, our initial focus is to get individuals onto the payroll. And then, what we need to do is work with the finalizations where we true up the actual amounts to which individuals are entitled. In most cases, that would be a project that we would turn to in earnest, you know, on a month like this.

One of the complicating factors that we have however is that in association with the large retirement surge and those, you know, somewhat incentives for people to retire, there also was this complicating factor of the retro payments and retro bonus payments that have to be made to individuals. Some of those retro payments are still being made and/or adjusted, and all of that activity has to take place before we can finalize cases. So we are in a bit

of a holding pattern for the next couple of weeks. We anticipate that most of those adjustments to the previous retro payments should be completed early next month, and we should be able to really focus in earnest on getting all of the finalizations completed.

Our goal would be to have all of these finalizations completed by the end of the year. That's an aggressive goal that we set before we kind of had to deal with some of the retro issues, so I don't know if that will hold. But we certainly would expect that by early next year, we will have all of the finalizations completed.

We also have kind of shifted focus for the disability retirements. We have really caught up to where we need to be with the 24-month reviews. And what we did for the first half of this year was to focus on the 24-month reviews to get caught up. There, and as you can see, you know, some of the initials kind of ticked up, and now we're caught up for the 24-month reviews. We're going to get caught up on the initials.

We're still in a really good place right now.

If an individual were to submit an application for a disability today, they would still be in position to go before the MEB by December. So by historic standards, that's a really good place. But we are trying to get

to a position whereas we are as close to real time as
possible.

But that's our report for this month.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Thank you.

Becky Simonsen, do you wish to comment? You have your hand up.

MS. SIMONSEN: Oh, no. That was accidental.

John, since the July date was significant monetarily, how's your confidence level that the 46 in August are those who didn't turn eligible until August, or are we going to have some layovers saying that they should have been in July and there was a delay et cetera and going to be asking the Commission for action?

MR. HERRINGTON: Right. So I can't speak to the 46, right. But the largest populations of individuals have rightly - would retire in August are hazardous duty individuals, individuals who weren't eligible for July 1st. And the hazardous duty population does make up kind of an outsized portion of that August number. What I will say is that I am aware

of two cases where individuals had concerns where there 1 2 were late submissions of paperwork, and those will 3 likely go before the Commission next month. But I'm only aware of two at this point where those claims have 4 been made. 5 MR. FLORES: Well, great. That's good. 6 7 Okay, thank you, John. MR. HERRINGTON: Yep. 8 CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Okay, thank you. 9 Marty Carlson? 10 11 MS. CARLSON: Good morning. I don't really have anything to say other than it was nice to watch 12 the staff take a deep breath over the past couple of 13 weeks before they gear up for what John is talking 14 15 about with the future of the Retirement Division.

I would also just remind everyone that the timeline of disability retirement applications getting on schedule is directly related to the documentation that comes in. So we can - you know, although it's been a stunning transition from a two-year wait to get on a schedule to a few months' wait to get on a schedule, the documentation still plays a key role in how quickly we can get them resolved.

Cathy Wilson. At the outset of an email, she is requesting to be taken off of disability retirement and revert back to the voluntary early retirement benefit. She retired from state service June 1st, 2017 at age 53 after completing 33 years and five months of vesting service as a Tier II member of SERS. Her fulltime equivalent credited service was 22 years and seven months, reflecting her parttime status as an employee during certain segments of her career, including her last period of employment from May 12th, 2006 to her date of retirement.

She retired while on a 50 percent position.

Her retirement application was for a non-serviceconnected disability retirement. As Ms. Wilson had not
yet reached the minimum age for retirement, she could
not elect to receive a voluntary benefit when she
awaited the outcome of the disability application. At
its June 8th, 2018 meeting, the Medical Examining Board
made the recommendation to deny. In response to the
MEB's decision, Ms. Wilson, by letter dated August 31st,
2018 stated that while it was her intention to request
reconsideration of the MEB's decision, she was
requesting commencement of her vested voluntary benefit
as she would turn 55 in November of 2018.

Effective December 1st, 2018, Ms. Wilson began

receiving voluntary retirement benefit in the amount of \$1,170 per month. Incidentally, Ms. Wilson was granted social security disability at the hearing level on September 24th, 2019, receiving the award notice on October 8th, 2019. The onset date for the social security award was January 10th, 2017 with payment starting six months later in the amount of \$1,788 per month.

At its April 3rd, 2020 meeting, the MEB on reconsideration approved Ms. Wilson's application for a non-service-connected disability retirement. Due to Ms. Wilson's receipt of social security disability serving as an offset to her benefit payable from SERS, the amount payable from SERS was reduced to \$543.78 per month. By letter dated November 23rd, 2020, Ms. Wilson's attorney requested that her type of retirement be reverted from a disability to a voluntary early retirement.

According to her attorney, Ms. Wilson had noticed her reduced benefit amount in the first check that she had received following the approval of the disability application and had reached out to the Division to question the accounting of her pert-time service.

Also in the letter, her attorney references

the online calculator and the fact that there is little information as to how to factor in her temp service, and the fact that the language in the disability section of the Tier II section summary plan description does not contain language on how to factor in parttime employment. The attorney also provided an estimate benefit that had been run through the online calculator. Her attorney did not reference the disclaimer page for the online calculator.

Lastly, when asked about it, her attorney provided an email where he had contacted a member of the Retirement Services Division. The email appears to have concluded that Ms. Wilson would be better off remaining with her voluntary benefit instead of pursuing the disability benefit. The Division responded by letter dated June 23rd, 2021 explaining that the request for her voluntary benefit could not be achieved as administrative closure on the type of retirement had occurred. However the matter was placed on the agenda of the Purchasing Subcommittee and the Purchasing Subcommittee in June had recommended that this matter be taken up by the full Commission.

The record is also in the materials that I sent. I know at the Purchasing Subcommittee, the Subcommittee had discussed an older case that may or

may not be applicable. I don't know if anyone from the Division has background on the older case that may be similar. And then I'll also add that the email that was referred to where Attorney Zimberlin had emailed the Division, it does not look like anyone had responded, but it does look like Attorney Zimberlin had concluded that the early retirement would be better for her. But in any event, she continued to pursue the disability retirement. I don't know if that - you know, the purpose or the reason behind that.

CHAIRMAN ADOMEIT: Thank you, Cindy.

MS. CIESLAK: Colin Newman, I see you took yourself off mute. Do you have anything to add?

MR. NEWMAN: What I was going to say was, I'm sorry, I can't remember the name of the individual, but the prior case where the individual — and actually, as I had stated in the Purchasing Subcommittee meeting, the person had wanted the reverse. They had wanted to go from a voluntary benefit to a disability benefit.

But I do know that the Commission at that time determined that they would not allow the person to change their type of benefit because I think the Commission concluded that, at the time when the person made the election to go towards a voluntary benefit, there was nothing that impeded their choice at the time

MR. LUCIANO: The fact that the Subcommittee didn't take a position is very interesting. I don't want to put anybody on the spot, but if there is somebody willing to explain why they didn't want to take a position, it's not usual that the subcommittees don't make a recommendation one way or the other.

MR. COFFEY: This is Bob. I'm on that subcommittee. I was at that meeting. My memory is not all that I want it to be, but at the same time, I think we looked at the fact that this was a situation where there had been some closure. The person had selected a retirement benefit and had been collecting it, and then at some point decided that they'd be better off switching. And I was looking to Colin for some precedent as to, you know, where we had gone in the past when someone had been collecting a benefit and wanting to switch, and what he just described is what we came up with.

So my concern is that we may be starting something - going down some road we may not want to go down by enabling people to change their minds once they start collecting a benefit. But at the same time, it was troublesome in that the person clearly would have been better off just sticking with the voluntary

retirement. As I recall, that was what the Subcommittee was going through.

MR. LUCIANO: Thank you very much, Bob. That's helpful.

MR. HERRINGTON: And I would kind of echo that in the sense that this may be a particular case with a particular set of facts where relief may be warranted. There may be other cases where someone's situation may change seven years down the road with respect to the receipt of offsetting income, and it would be kind of difficult if each time that that occurred, we would need to kind of revisit and allow people to kind of change their retirement types.

And I guess the question would be whether that would be a general rule, whether that would be something that would be individual, and whether that would be something that would come before this body to make those types of determinations. But what I would say is to the extent that there is a conclusion that was made by an individual that was represented by counsel, that that counsel didn't necessarily get a confirmation, and then went forward and applied for the disability retirement.

I'm not certain, you know, what those facts actually would lead most people to conclude. But what
